Course Description (goals and purposes in general):

This class is for non-native English speakers. It teaches listening, speaking, reading, and writing at an Intermediate Level of English proficiency. Emphasis is on vocabulary development and fluency in survival situations and in expressing one's needs and desires.

Performance Objectives:

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate understanding of everyday conversation with some repetition or slower speech.
- 2. Demonstrate understanding of stories and other passages when vocabulary and structures are in familiar contexts.
- 3. Guess the meaning of unfamiliar vocabulary and phrases from context.
- 4. Make affirmative and negative sentences and questions in the present, past, or future tenses.
- 5. Understand culture through contrasting topics such as taboos and politics among cultures.
- 6. Use English to carry out the following language functions: compare/contrast, express possibility, offer to do something, express sympathy, express hope, express regret, recommend, solve problems, instruct.

Sentence Types:

Adverbial clauses of time: "when", "before", "after" I'll call you *when* he comes.

Adverbial clauses of reason: "because"

I was absent *because* he was sick.

Direct speech

He said, "It's time to pay the rent."

Exclamatory sentences:

What a beautiful day!

Adjectival clauses:

The person who made the announcement was the manager.

The book, which is on top, is mine.

Indirect speech:

He said he was going.

Embedded questions:

Do you know what time it is?

Verbs:

Used to

I used to live in Mexico.

Modals: "might", "must"

It might rain.

You must be tired.

Past continuous

I was taking a shower when he called.

Present perfect

I have lived the U.S for two years.

Present perfect continuous

I have been studying English since last year.

Future conditional

If I get a job, I'll take night classes.

Verbs followed by gerunds

He enjoys dancing

He likes swimming.

Past perfect

He had worked there for ten years when he got a promotion.

Past perfect continuous

She had been crying when her mother found her.

Conditional contrary-to-fact

If I were rich, I would buy a house.

Passive simple present

The mail is delivered every afternoon.

Instructional Methods:

Modeling, cooperative learning, student/student interviews, paraphrasing, role play, Information Gap activities, student/teacher question and answer, oral reports, singing, plays, demonstrations, class-made charts on board, group discussion, focused listening, puzzles

Student Evaluation:

Progress is measured in the following ways: teacher observation, individual and group tasks, comprehension exercises, role play, paper/pencil quizzes, puzzle games, vocabulary matching, cloze paragraphs

Times of Instruction/Length of Course:

Once/week course: 3 hours a class x 1 time a week x 36 weeks = 108

instructional hours

Twice/week course: 3 hours a class x 2 times a week x 36 weeks = 216

instructional hours

Three time/week course: 3 hours a class x 3 times a week x 36 weeks = 324

instructional hours
